Severe Weather Threat South & East

- The final day of the sprawling 1,000-mile, multi-day severe weather threat that slammed the Heartland Tuesday will target more than 95 million people as it charges into Eastern Seaboard Wednesday.
- The same cold front responsible for Tuesday's storms will push through the Mississippi Valley and eventually into the Ohio and Tennessee valleys, triggering thunderstorm development.
- All modes of severe weather are possible on Wednesday, including damaging wind gusts, hail and tornadoes.
- A large Level 2 out of 5 risk of severe thunderstorms stretches from East Texas through the Lower Mississippi, Tennessee and Ohio valleys.
- This includes the Houston, New Orleans, Nashville, Pittsburg and Washington, D.C. metro areas.
- Two main zones are in the bull's-eye of Wednesday's tornado threat: the Deep South from East Texas through southern Alabama, and the Ohio Valley from Central Ohio to western Pennsylvania, West Virginia and western Maryland.
- Strong EF-2 tornadoes are possible in these areas; EF-1 tornadoes are possible in Washington, D.C. and just west of Philadelphia.
- The southern threat zone for strong tornadoes includes Houston, New Orleans, Mobile, Montgomery and Birmingham, Alabama, as well as Memphis, Tennessee.



Severe Weather Activity


- About 200 reports of severe weather were received by the National Weather Service Tuesday through early Wednesday morning, the most of any 24-hour period in the U.S. since July 28.
- The most heavily damaged areas were from one supercell thunderstorm which tracked over 120 miles in almost 4.5 hours from northeast Illinois into northern Indiana. That supercell spawned destructive tornadoes in Kankakee, Illinois, Lake Village and Wheatfield, Indiana, according to the National Weather Service.
- This supercell also dumped giant hail from 5 to 6 inches in diameter in or near Buckingham, Campus and Kankakee, Illinois.
- A second supercell thunderstorm tracked into Chicagoland, dumping 3 to 5-inch diameter hail in the far southwest suburbs of Bolingbrook and Darien, then half-dollar size hail downtown at the Loop.

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- Elsewhere, hail up to baseball size pelted the western Oklahoma City metro area from a tornado-warned supercell thunderstorm. Several severe thunderstorms pelted the Kansas City metro with hail up to 2 inches in diameter.
- At least two tornadoes touched down in western Texas, one just southeast of Abilene and the other just east of Laughlin Air Force Base near Del Rio.
- Flash flooding stranded vehicles in Grand Rapids and near Holland, Michigan.
