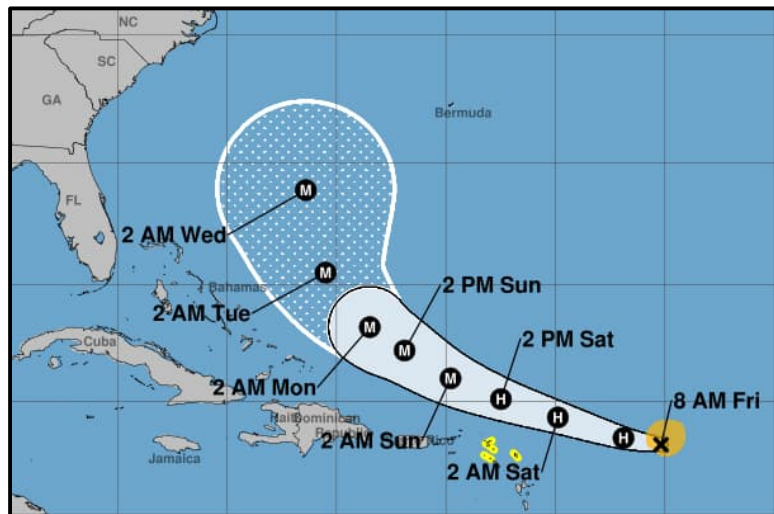

## Tropical Activity

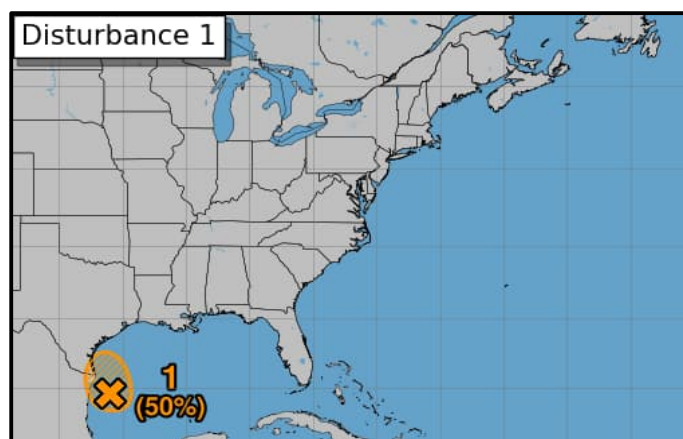
### Atlantic - Tropical Storm Erin

- Tropical Storm Erin is located more than 500 miles east of the Northern Leeward Islands and is likely to become a hurricane today.
- Erin is forecast to become a major hurricane over the weekend with the center of the storm moving just north of Puerto Rico and U.S. Virgin Islands.
- Rainfall totals of 2 to 4 inches, with isolated totals of 6 inches, are expected to bring isolated flash and urban flooding this weekend into early next week over southern and eastern Puerto Rico and U.S. Virgin Islands.
- This weekend into early next week is when this system will begin to turn more to the north between a developing break in high pressure.
- Where that turn occurs between the area of high pressure over the eastern U.S. and another one east of Bermuda is still uncertain and will determine what, if any, land areas might see impacts next week.
- The probability of a landfall from Erin along the U.S. East Coast is low at this time.
- However, interests along the East Coast should continue to monitor this system for possible changes. Erin will generate high surf and dangerous rip currents along the U.S. East Coast next week, no matter where it tracks.



### Atlantic – Disturbance 1

- An area of low pressure located about 75 miles off the coast of northeastern Mexico or southern Texas coastline.
- The system could become a short-lived tropical depression before it moves inland this afternoon or evening.
- Regardless of development, locally heavy rainfall is possible along portions of northeastern Mexico and southern Texas over the next couple of days.
- Formation chance – 48-hour: Med (50%); 7-day: Med (50%)



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## Severe Weather & Flooding

### Illinois (July 25-28)

- Local, state and federal partners are out assessing flood damage from heavy rain the Chicago area saw between July 25 and July 28.
- The city says nearly 3,000 people reported flood damage from the heavy rain at the end of last month.
- According to the surveys, 111 homes were considered destroyed by the storms, while 544 sustained major damage, 1,451 were considered to have minor damage and another 1,018 were affected.
- Areas across the Southwest Side were hit hardest, including suburban Burbank, Justice and Summit.
- The Federal Emergency Management Agency and state officials are joining Cook County to survey the damage.
- There are nine groups spread out right now across the area. They plan to continue door-knocking throughout other neighborhoods on the Southwest Side through Sunday.
