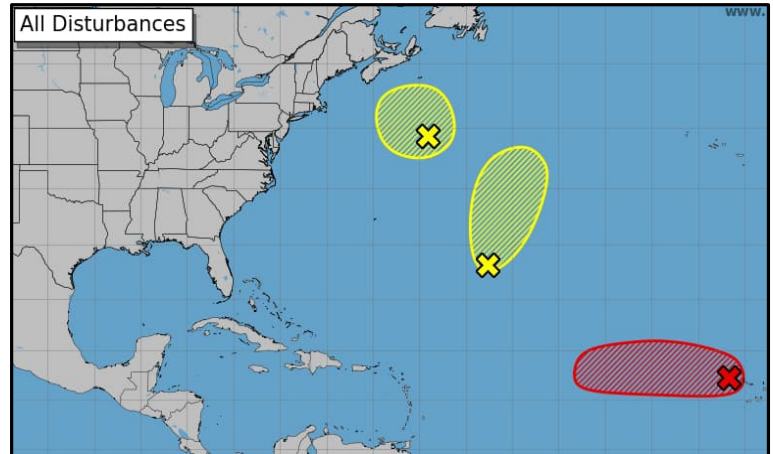

## Tropical Activity

### Atlantic - Disturbance #1

- Shower and thunderstorm activity has persisted and continues to show signs of organization with a well-defined area of low pressure.
- Located just to the west of the Cabo Verde Islands.
- If trends continue, the system is likely to become a tropical depression or storm, possibly as soon as later this morning.
- The system is expected to continue moving westward to west-northwestward at 15 to 20 mph across the eastern and central tropical Atlantic.
- Formation chance through 48 hours - High (90%)
- Formation chance through 7 days - High (90%)



### Atlantic - Disturbance #2

- A weak trough of low pressure located over the central Atlantic is producing limited shower and thunderstorm activity.
- Significant development of this system is becoming unlikely over the next few days as it drifts generally northward, remaining over the central Atlantic.
- Formation chance through 48 hours - Low (10%)
- Formation chance through 7 days - Low (10%)

### Atlantic - Disturbance #3

- A non-tropical area of low pressure is currently located a few hundred miles to the south-south-east of Nova Scotia, Canada.
- This system is drifting over the warm waters of the Gulf Stream where some tropical or subtropical development could occur over the next day or two.
- By the middle of this week, the system is expected to move northward over cooler waters, ending its chances for further tropical development.
- Formation chance through 48 hours - Low (10%)
- Formation chance through 7 days - Low (10%)

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## Flooding Activity

### Wisconsin

- A dangerous flash flooding situation unfolded across portions of Wisconsin, including the Milwaukee area.
- Rounds of torrential rain and thunderstorms led to Milwaukee seeing its second-wettest day on record on Saturday.
- Milwaukee, Wisconsin, experienced widespread flooding after 5.74 inches of rain fell on August 9, according to the National Weather Service (NWS).
- Storm totals reached nearly 7 inches in Milwaukee by the morning of August 10, while surrounding locations reported 10–11 inches.
- The Milwaukee River at Estabrook Park crested at 11.19 feet.
- "We're seeing reports from some parts of the city that have received more than a foot of rain in a very short period of time," Milwaukee Mayor Chevy Johnson said on Sunday.
- Power outages affected approximately 47,000 customers across southeastern Wisconsin.
