

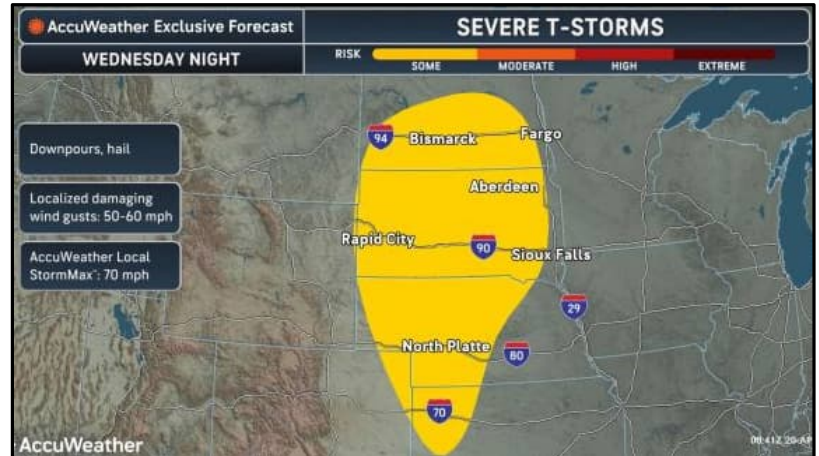

WSP USA INSPECTION SERVICES DISASTER AWARENESS REPORT

April 20, 2026

Severe Weather Outlook

- After a lull in severe weather across the central United States through early week, the risk will be renewed mid- to late week, AccuWeather meteorologists say.
- The risk will start on Wednesday, as thunderstorms are expected to blossom from western Kansas to North and South Dakota.
- "The primary threat will be hail, but there can still be localized damaging wind gusts up to 60 mph and downpours," explained AccuWeather Meteorologist Peyton Simmers.
- A more widespread area will be at risk for severe thunderstorms Thursday and Thursday night as a storm and associated front will track across the central U.S.
- Hazards, including hail, isolated tornadoes and localized damaging wind gusts of 60-70 mph, could occur in any storm that turns severe.
- The storm and associated front will slowly make its way east, promoting a corridor of showers and thunderstorms Friday and Friday night across portions of the Mississippi Valley and Gulf Coast states.



Flooding Activity

Michigan

- The combination of heavy rainfall and rapid snowmelt has led many rivers across Wisconsin and Michigan to exceed their average limits and show no signs of slowing down as the flood threat remains.
- Waters were receding slowly at the Cheboygan Dam and Lock Complex on Sunday, falling 0.36 inches overnight. They were 7.32 inches from the top of the dam at 8:30 a.m. Sunday.
- Several rivers in Michigan, particularly in the northern Lower Peninsula, remain at risk for flooding. But most have crested and are beginning to return to normal, according to the National Weather Service.
- In Antrim County, water levels at the Bellaire Dam lowered enough that county officials rescinded evacuation warnings to downstream residents with a similar situation for the Hesperia Dam in Oceana County, according to local media reports.
- On Friday April 17, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer declared states of emergencies in Eaton, Jackson, Mecosta and Muskegon counties as well as the cities of Ann Arbor and Kalamazoo.
- Separately, the counties of Kalamazoo and Muskegon have declared local emergencies due to damage to infrastructure and basements.

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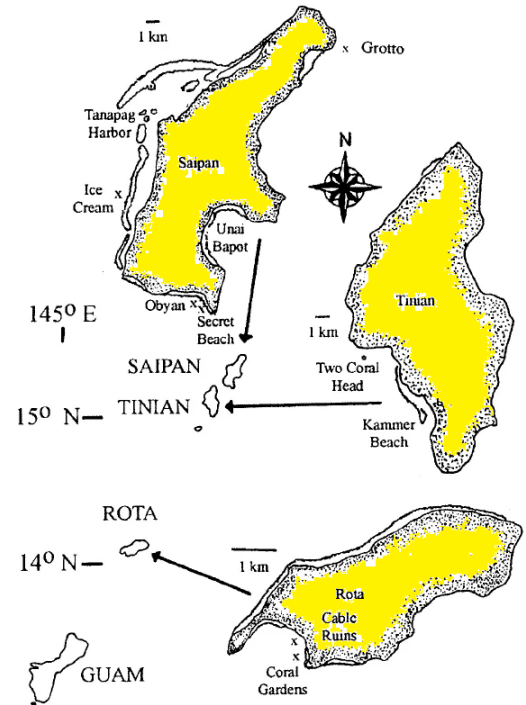

Commonwealth of Northern Mariana Islands

- Super Typhoon Sinlaku formed southeast of the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, or CNMI, and Guam, two U.S. territories that make up the Mariana Islands archipelago in the western Pacific, and rapidly grew to a Category 5, 185-mph monstrosity.
- Super Typhoon Sinlaku cut across the islands of Tinian and Saipan in the Northern Mariana Islands and brought high winds and heavy rain.
- At its peak, Sinlaku produced maximum sustained winds of 185 miles per hour and a minimum central pressure of 896 millibars, making it one of the few category 5 storms to form between January and April and the second strongest Pacific typhoon.
- The eye of the typhoon came ashore on Tinian and Saipan during the late evening on April 14 as a category 4 storm.
- Although the storm produced no deaths, Sinlaku left thousands of residents without electricity on Saipan and Tinian, after winds knocked down power poles.
- The airport at Saipan reported a single-day total of nearly 6 inches on April 14, whereas Guam International Airport received 9 inches of rain in total from the storm.
- An all clear was declared in the CNMI on Friday as Sinlaku tracked away, ending more than 50 hours of destructive winds, flooding, and widespread damage.
