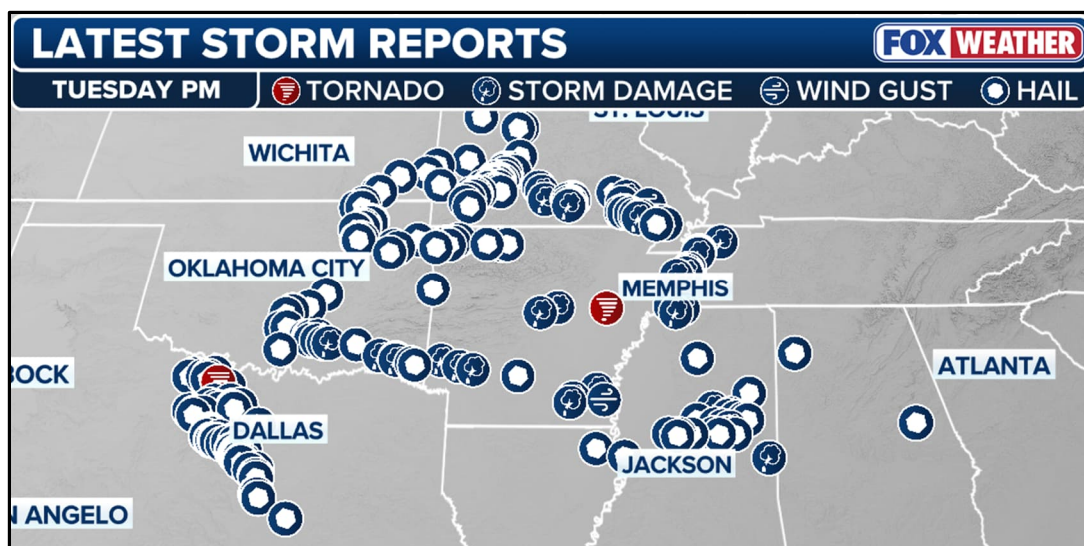

Severe Storm Activity

Texas

- A destructive tornado tore through the town of Mineral Wells in North Texas, leaving a trail of significant structural damage and reported injuries Tuesday evening, officials said.
- Overnight, officials declared a local state of disaster as first responders continued to assist those affected, assess the damage, and secure impacted areas to ensure public safety.
- The city has implemented a curfew for areas with extensive damage until 6 a.m. Wednesday, followed by a nightly 8 p.m. to 6 a.m. curfew until further notice.
- The National Weather Service (NWS) will now survey the damage to determine the tornado's strength.
- On Tuesday, the NWS issued a Tornado Warning for Southern Parker County at 5:11 p.m. CDT, warning of a confirmed, radar-indicated tornado that impacted Mineral Wells, among other areas.
- At 5:10 p.m. CDT, a confirmed tornado was located along Highway 180 just west of Cool, Texas, roughly three miles east of Mineral Wells, moving towards the city at 25 mph, the warning said.
- Located just outside the Dallas Fort Worth Metroplex, the tornado ripped through Mineral Wells, destroying buildings and scattering debris across roads and parking lots, in addition to causing injuries, city officials told FOX 4 KDFW
- The devastating twister follows severe storms that swept across the region, killing two people in Texas and significantly impacting Parker County and other areas across the South.



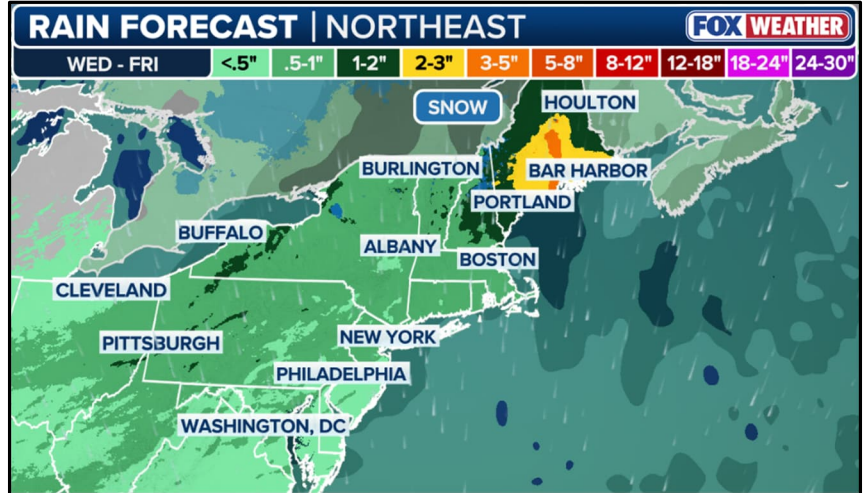

Flash Flood Risk Northeast U.S.

- Another round of rain is headed to the Northeast as more precipitation is set to arrive Wednesday night and last through the remainder of the workweek.
- The initial burst of heavier rain will arrive along the I-95 corridor by the evening and push into New England through Thursday.
- A widespread 1 to 2 inches of rain is expected across the interior, while northern New England could see 2 to 3+ inches. This brings the possibility of isolated flash flooding.
- As this system pushes east, and some instability grows, severe storms will be possible across the Mid-Atlantic and the Carolinas into the afternoon Wednesday. This mainly includes a risk for damaging winds and hail, though an isolated tornado or two cannot be ruled out, the FOX Forecast Center said.
- Cities in the risk zone include Washington, D.C., Richmond, Virginia, and areas farther south into Raleigh, North Carolina, where a Level 1 severe storm threat has been issued.
- As the system tracks east into Thursday, it will gain strength off the New England coastline by drawing in tropical moisture from the Southeast coast.
- Come Friday afternoon, a widespread 1 to 2 inches of rain will be possible across the interior Northeast, from upstate New York through Vermont, New Hampshire, and Maine.
